What pieces in the Met's collection are particularly inspiring, critical of, interesting on the topic of historical female iconography and the representation of the female form?


How can be new media play with these historical art pieces to make the user have a new experience with respect to gender and identity?


Subvert the male form using creative coding / new media techniques in art. Create a new work of art that tells a different story.






















